

The Lucky Star Casinos will follow guidelines and standards that other casinos use across the country to protect patrons and employees. Significant social distancing efforts will include but not limited to, reduced and distanced seating at all restaurants and every other gaming machine will be powered off to ensure physical distance between patrons. Plexiglas barriers may be installed in key locations across the different casino properties. Face masks or face coverings will be highly encouraged for everyone on the casino property and will be available for all patrons.

Casino hours of operations will be adjusted from weekend to weekdays until data supports casinos being opened 24 hours a day. Ongoing enhanced cleaning measures will be implemented for deep cleaning. Also, the casinos will be working with Indian Health Service to screen all employees returning to work.

On the tribal government side, essential staff will tentatively report back to work on Tuesday, May 26 at 8 a.m. and the remaining employees will tentatively report back to work on Monday, June 1 at 8 a.m.

“The health and safety of our community and employees is always our highest priority and through this pandemic, we have relied on facts from the CDC and health experts to guide our decisions,” said Gov. Reggie Wassana.

The guidelines for reopening are based on local COVID-19 trends and data. The plan is also consistent with guidelines released by the federal and state government. Local data and trends will be regularly reviewed and we will provide recommendations as the situation continues to change.
